Dearest Kincaid community,

I've been gifted the fortune of being able to contribute as the guest in the Chief's Column this year. My heart goes out to our Chief, our Seanchaidh, and all our contributors for finding inspiration to share stories with us in our Defender that help connect us all. It took a moment for me, ok a lot of moments for me, to put down the thoughts I had in my head for our annual guest Chief's Column. As I sat in my room peering at the foothills beyond my home, they struck me as beautiful, but also a bit daunting because I know that behind them sit vast forests and amazing peaks that I have yet to explore. Don't get me wrong, I am excited for the adventure and the chances I may have had to venture into them. While I am no pioneer, my forays into the wildness are my own small adventures and a chance to see something "new". It struck me then as I mused, that I am in fact related to a Kincaid who is an actual pioneer. I had featured a quick note in the last Defender issue about a Kincaid Reunion in 1973 that was attended by a variety of Kincaid kin including my grandfather Wilfred Kincaid, and my mother Valerie Kincaid. Also featured was one Daisy K. Whitney.

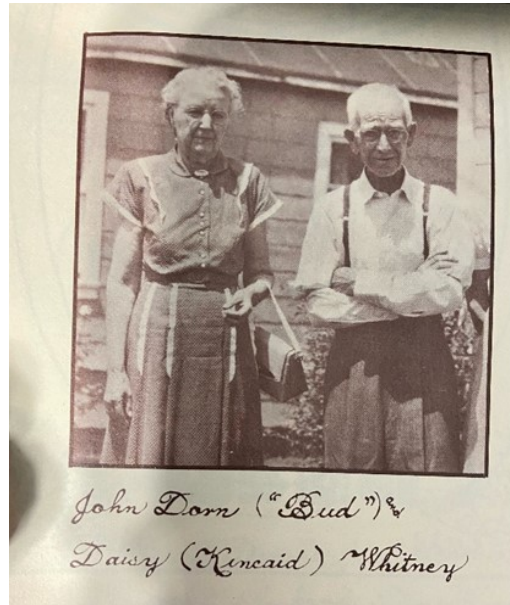
Daisy Olive Kincaid was born July 1880 in Ashland, Oregon. She passed away in Ashland, Oregon March 7, 1979 at the age of 98, but in between she was quite the adventurer. It makes sense really as her parents were pioneers themselves, traveling across the West in covered wagon and train to finally land in Ashland, Oregon. Daisy was known to many as adventurer even as a child. She continued that when she left Ashland for the Yukon goldrush at the age of sixteen in 1886. It was told to me by my grandfather that she brought the first typewriter to arrive in Alaska with the intention of being a journalist.

In the Yukon, she met a prospector and her future husband, John "Bud" Whitney. She and Bud moved around the prospecting regions of Alaska, eventually becoming some of the first not-native people to reach the region of Alaska that is now Elmendorf Air Force Base and Fort Richardson. Prior to the area being acquired by the US government for a military base, the Whitneys operated a homestead roughly 7 miles outside Anchorage known as "Whitney Station" along Shipcreek River. They lived in a log cabin and on homestead of over 300 acres until 1941 when they sold their land, and the air force base and army post were constructed.

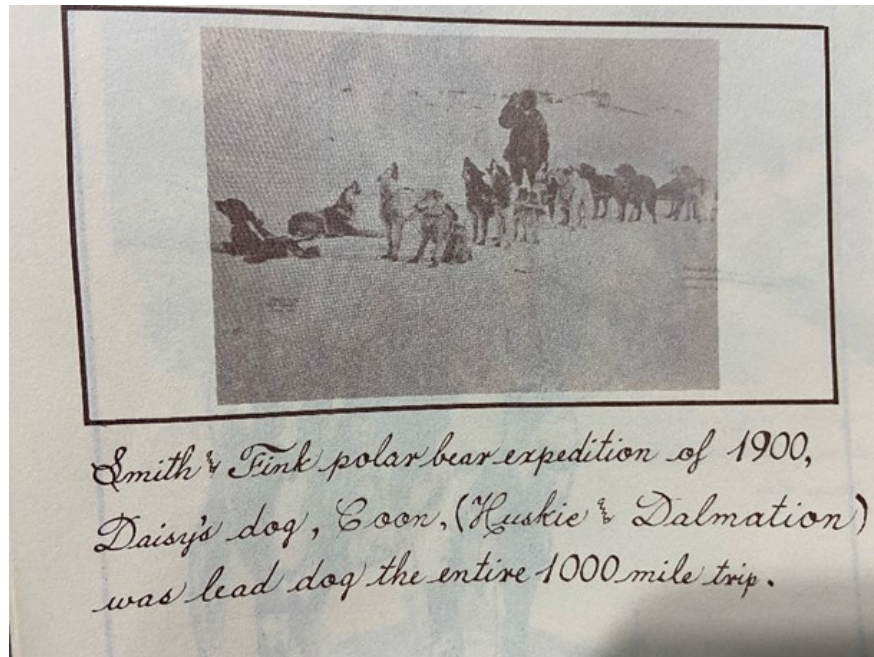
As you can imagine, life on an isolated homestead in Alaska in the early 1900's was not glamorous, and it certainly took some nerve to stay there! When interviewed about her time in Alaska, she reminisced about stories that included drunken soldiers, prisoner guarding, dog mushing from Nome, and polar bear hunting. Daisy had her own mushing dogs, who were featured in dog mushing races, as well a 1000-mile hunting expedition in 1900.

The more I read about her I can't help but be filled with respect at the strength of character such a journey must have taken, and especially for a woman in uncharted territory at the turn of the 19th century. 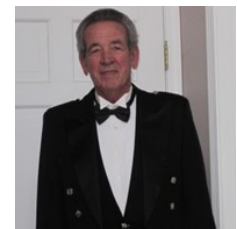

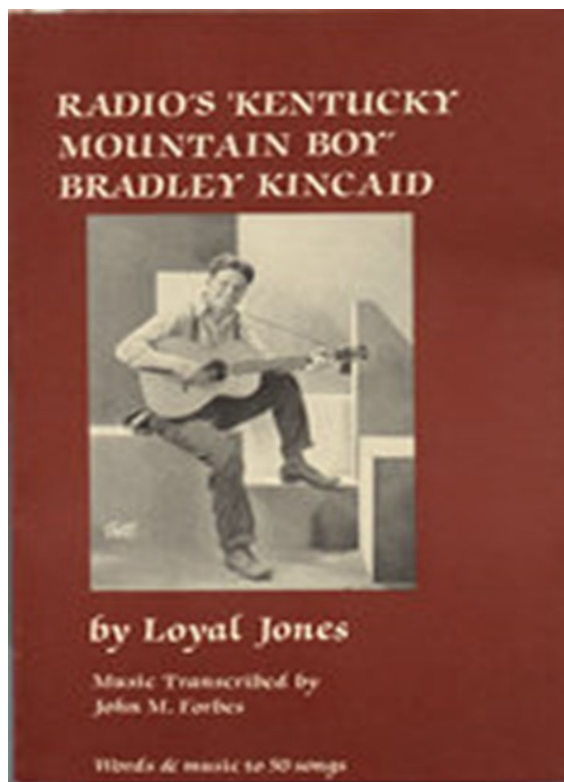

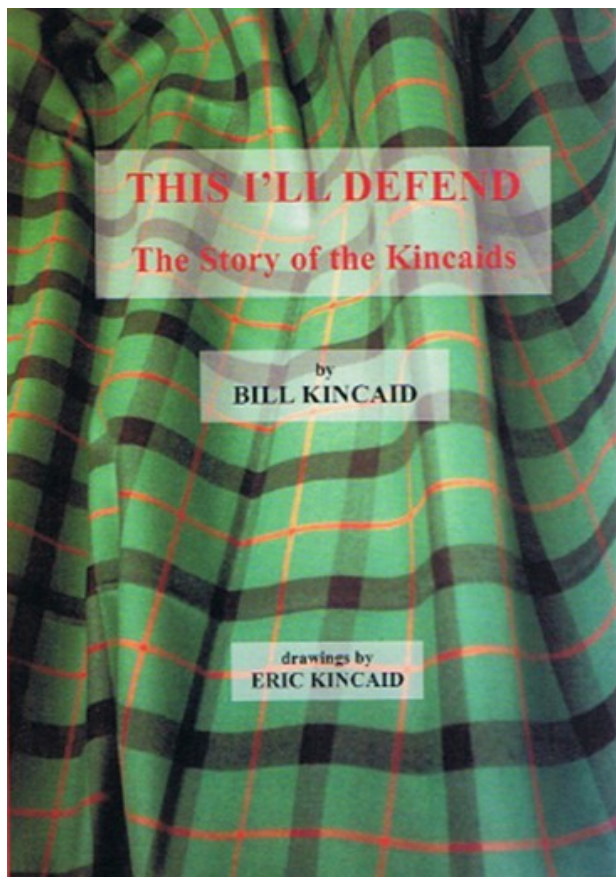

Grandfather Mountain Scottish Festival and Games

The granddaddy of highland games, the Grandfather Mountain Highland Games and Gathering of Clans was held July 7th through the 9th.

The weather was pleasant and Scotland-like. Take that to mean mild with occasional drizzles. As my grandfather used to say, "There's no such thing as bad weather, just poor wardrobe choices!"

One of the unique events at Grandfather Mountain is the running of the Bear, a footrace from the base of the mountain to the peak, a gain in altitude of about 2300 feet. For those of you who have been to this particular games, you know it's a very popular event. Sadly, tragedy marred this year's Bear. A runner at the starting line was struck by an automobile and died. The Bear was canceled and we all grieved the tragic loss of life.

There were well over 100 clans represented and the attendance topped 50,000 and the Appalachian Kincaids were out in force! We hosted many cousins, including relatives of Wade Kincaid, who founded the Kincaid Furniture Company here in North Carolina in 1924. Many of these cousins were first time attendees at a highland game and we signed up eight new members for our clan association. Clan Lennox, hosted by Canadian Commissioner Marcus Lennox, set up beside Clan Kincaid and we shared not a few wee drams of fine single malt with guests. I was joined by my wife, daughter and two grandchildren who helped make the day even more enjoyable. I also met two Kincaid's who are going to consider membership in the Association - a real bonus!

After hosting or co-hosting tents at the Fergus Scottish Festival for about 15 years and 6 other festivals in Ontario and in addition to 18 different States (some multiple times) it is time to hang up the kilt and let the next generation take over. James Brisbin shared the below technical information from the King of Arms publication and how they reflect for Kincaid names. This has been taken from the “The General Armoury” by Sir Bernard Burke C.B. LL.D Ulster King of Arms published in 1884. pp: 564-565. The Lord Lyon is the chief heraldic officer of Scotland, and their duties concern the Scottish heraldic laws and conduct as well as storing and filing all heraldic arms. More can be found at <https://www.courtofthelordlyon.scot/>

The following is an exact transcription of the three (3) entries for the name Kincaid. I hope that you might find them interesting. The technical transcription is very involved, which I am sure you will notice as these descriptions are unlike our usual speech of today.

“Kincaid (that Ilk, co. Stirling). Gu. A fess erm. betw. two mullets in chief or, and a castle triple-towered in base ar masoned sa. *Crest* – A castle, as in the arms, and issuing therefrom a dexter arm embowed, grasping a sword ppr. *Supporters* – Two Highlanders armed with cuirases, each grasping a Lochaber axe all ppr. *Motto*- I’ll defend.

Translation/explanation:

co. = county

Ilk = of the place or estate of the same name.

gu = red.

fess = The Fess is formed by two horizontal lines drawn across the field, comprising the centre third part of the escutcheon (shield) It is emblematic of the military girdle worn around the body over the armour.

erm – ermine – a white field with black spots.

betw = between.

mullets = 5 pointed stars.

or = yellow or gold

chief – above or top.

ar = silver.

sa= black

dexter = right

embowed = bent

ppr = straight/upright

cuirases = piece of armor consisting of breastplate and backplate fastened together

Lochaber axe = a type of [poleaxe](#) that was used almost exclusively in [Scotland](#). It was usually mounted on a staff about five feet long

Kincaid (Lord Provost of Edinburgh, 1776) Gu. On a chev. ar. three stars of the field, in chief two spur rowels or, and in base a castle of the second masoned sa. *Crest* – a dexter arm from the elbow holding a drawn sword ppr. *Motto* – I will defend.

Additional translation:

chev = chevron – an inverted “V”.

rowels = spiked revolving disks at the end of a spur.

Kincaid (Thomas Kincaid, surgeon, Edinburgh. 1685). Gu. On a fess erm. betw. Two mullets in chief or, and a castle triple-towered in base, masoned sa. a lozenge of the first. *Crest* – A dexter hand holding a chirurgeon’s instrument, called bistoury, ppr. *Motto* – Incidendo sano.

Additional translations:

Lozenge of the first = a diamond on the fess.

Bistoury = a surgical knife with a long, narrow, straight or curved blade.

Incidendo sano = I cure by incision

Note the picture on page 36 of Bill Kincaid’s book “This I’ll Defend” is in error by this description as it shows three mullets not two as per Burke’s

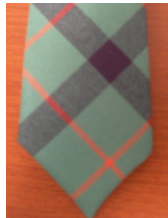
